

Sharing Christ Crucified with High School Youth — Lutheran High School of Greater New Orleans, LA \$35,000

Lutheran High School of Greater New Orleans, the only high school in the LCMS Southern District, has been serving youth for over 50 years. It provides students with the opportunity to academically succeed in a safe environment, while educating them about their Lord and Savior through the teachings of the LCMS. Many of the students being served by the school are disadvantaged, culturally diverse, and unchurched. Because the school was devastated by Hurricane Ida, funds which would have been used for computers, school supplies, Christian materials, and scholarship aid are now being used for construction costs to rebuild one of the buildings. This grant will be matched by five generous donors and will be used to pay the tuition costs of ten students.

On February 27, 2024 Religion Teacher Rev. Limkatso Nare, students, and faculty opened the weekly Tuesday morning LHS Chapel Service held in adjacent First English Lutheran Church, in the name of our Triune God. The student Choir and guitarist led us in two praise songs. Student Activities Director/Athletic Director Mitzi Loughmiller presented an interactive devotional based on the Bible verse, "Yes, I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will produce much fruit. For apart from me you can do nothing

(John 15:5 NLT). This verse fit well into the theme of their week-long celebration of National Lutheran Schools — "Connected." To further enhance this message, students from the Service Club performed two skits entitled Vines University. We all learned that Jesus Christ chooses to connect to us, and through the working of the Holy Spirit we remain connected to Him, bearing fruit to share with others.

Following the conclusion of the Chapel Service, the second half of LWML Mission Grant #12 partial payment check was joyfully presented and received. The student Yearbook photographer captured the smiles in this presentation.

Glory be to our Triune God for blessing us with Lutheran High School of Greater New Orleans and this LWML Mission Grant funded by Mite Box offerings to extend His kingdom and to the great task of bringing the lost and the erring into eternal fellowship with Him.

I Guess I'll Go Eat Worms!

Back in the old days I was a Cub Scout leader. One of the young boys' favorite songs was the "Guess I'll Go Eat Worms" song.

Sometimes I just get in a "nobody likes me – everybody hates me, guess I'll go eat worms" kind of mood. You know the feeling – things aren't going as I planned, maybe someone said something to me and I just took it the wrong way or I'll stay awake at night worrying about the silliest things of which I have no control like our government, the whole world – yada, yada, yada – you get the idea. I suspect I'm not the only one with those feelings and its times like those that I don't eat worms but I do turn to God's Word.

Psalm 91 is one of my favorite psalms for those times. I love verse 4 – *He will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness is a shield and buckler.* Psalm 91 testifies to the security of all who place their trust in God. The wings of God serve to gather, protect, and bear up His children.

Martin Luther speaks about this psalm in the book *Reading the Psalms with Luther* in this way, "The 91st psalm is a psalm of comfort that exhorts us to trust in God in all distress and affliction. It is full of abundant promises flowing from and spun from the First Commandment. It is the second psalm in which the dear angels are proclaimed to be our guards and protectors (cf. Psalm 34), which is comforting and good to remember."

We also have such a wonderful treasure in our *Lutheran Service Book*...hymn 727 "On Eagles Wings." This hymn was written by Michael Joncas. In the 1970's he visited a fellow seminary friend. He and his friend went out for dinner and when they returned there was a message waiting for him that his father had had a heart attack and died. This hymn was sung at the friend's father's funeral. Go to the <u>Lutheran Service Book hymn 727 sung by St. Matthew on YouTube - Google Search</u> to hear St. Matthew Lutheran Church sing the hymn.

I think The Lutheran Study Bible commentary sums up Psalm 91 beautifully,

"How quickly life can go from smooth and routine to troubled and fearful. How encouraging it is to know of God's protection. Our security comes from His promises kept. Jesus trampled Satan once and for all when He gloriously rose from the dead. We walk in victory even during dangerous times because He is with us and will not let us be separated from His love."

He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will abide in the Shadow of the Almighty. I will say to the Lord, "My refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." (Psalm 91:1-2)

In 2023 a deadly tornado cut through the small community of Selma, Alabama. The LCMS responded to this event, and was able to send various recovery groups who served this community for a few months. FBF was able to play a very small part for a few days, serving the community from Trinity.

As a way of letting the community know they are not forgotten, but loved, the LCMS helped cover some of the cost of this trip back to Selma. It was a great community outreach event for Trinity Lutheran and Pastor Washington. In addition to the community receiving meals [700+ meals], our spiritual care tent provided prayers and water to anyone who came up. I believe that every vehicle that came through the line [over 300 cars], stopped for prayers from our team. What a blessing it is to be the hands and feet of our Savior Christ Jesus!

Next, I had the more difficult task of informing those who had proposed the last six projects that we would not be able to fund a grant for them at that time. While I expressed my regrets, I also thanked them for the work they were doing and promised to remember their efforts with prayer. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people (Ephesians 6:18b. NIV).

So, I would like to ask all of you to lift prayers for the following:

- 1. Helping the families of Military Chaplains to attend Church Worker Wellness Retreats. 160 LCMS Chaplains serve our nation around the world. This project would provide funds so the spouses of the chaplains could also attend these important retreats.
- 2. The Faith and Hope Center in Siberia. The LCMS works to provide church services, Bible study, and Christian counseling in the cultural and educational center of Novosibirsk.
- 3. Providing LOGOS Bible Software for students at Concordia Seminary. This software is essential to the study of the Bible for our future pastors.
- 4. The Lutheran Heritage Foundation's project to provide the translation and printing of <u>A Child's</u> Garden of Bible Stories in Haitian Creole to be distributed to families in Haiti.
- 5. Ministry in Mission's project to bring both spiritual and physical care to the people of Haiti.
- 6. The Trinity HOPE project to provide a daily meal for the students and staff of a Lutheran school in Haiti.

Now we look forward to our new biennium. There are new decisions to be made. Please check out the thirteen mission grant proposals that our delegates will be voting on at our District Convention. The Village-Lacombe has a newly appointed LWML board and is looking forward to deepening their relationship with God. They had their first meeting on March 10, with 20 ladies in attendance; and plan on having monthly Christ-centered and fun gatherings where

they will encourage all of their ladies to enjoy a devotion, craft, food and fellowship. They will also have quarterly business meetings. As most everyone

knows, The Village has awesome fish fry(s); learned through their involvement with *Forged by Fire*. The ladies participate by making desserts which has allowed them to raise \$500. Plans are to participate in all of the Men's Club fish fry(s).

Zion-Bogalusa has also seen progress in their efforts to revive their society. In November, the Church celebrated their 112th birthday, where the ladies served breakfast and lunch to approximately 42 guests, and Southern District President Eric Johnson attended and delivered the message. This year, they have so far collected nine boxes of food to help feed needy families, made 50 Valentine bags containing fruit cups and applesauce for the Senior Center, and helped a local family with furniture, a microwave and food. They also participated in many community activities, such as a gumbo cook-off and a chili cook-off; where Barbara Alston won 3rd place. The Zone is also thankful to that their Society President, Cara Hall, joined the Executive Committee as Interim Secretary when Sarah Arthur resigned due to her family relocating when her husband accepted a call in the Southwest Zone. Sarah will be truly missed but we're sure the SW Zone will be blessed and happy to keep her active in LWML.

Cross of Calvary University-Baton Rouge shares that they are also blessed; having new interest in their LWML due to taking in new church members by way of their merger with Calvary Lutheran-BR. They have a meeting planned in April to reorganize and plan activities for the coming year. Praise God for the growth that He has granted "us"!

Redeemer-Mandeville has been able to meet their 2023 Mite Goal of \$1,100! For their February Service Project, they gathered and donated men's clothes, small appliances, and winter coats to Community Christian Concern (CCC is a men's homeless shelter Slidell). Once again, they applied for a Thrivent grant to help fund their project (if you need more information on doing this, Laurie Drosendahl will be happy to share). The grant helped them to purchase new sheets and men's underwear and socks. Their spring project allowed them to immediately bless the men who receive CCC assistance by collecting and delivering six full vans and a truck of sorted and labeled donations. Since most of their projects benefit women, they are glad they were able to show some love to the men.

Holy Trinity-Covington/New Life-Folsom has collected items for residents of Heritage Nursing Home in Franklinton; each resident received two boxes – one edible treats and one with socks and toiletry items. They enjoyed handing the to the residents in person. At their Christmas luncheon they enjoyed an ornament gift exchange along with their meal. In January, they participated in the Zone Phil's Friends Servant Event...their society made Encouragement Cards. February was a blast decorating Mardi Gras masks; and March was a perfect meeting, participating in Bible study.

St. Paul-Hammond began with a congregational luncheon in November for Rev. Eric Stinnett and his mother Esther. They updated the congregation on the Stinnett Family Mission work in Ethiopia. A fundraiser for Lutheran Bible Translators followed the next day; raising a total of \$1,000. The ladies of the congregation got together in December to prepare 300 recycled Christmas cards to share with three local nursing homes; a special Christmas greeting and a *Mustard Seed Devotion* was inserted in each card. The ladies were excited to host a Zone Phil's Friends Workshop in January; making quilts, fleece blankets, journals and greeting cards for cancer patients. Fifteen ladies from four congregations participated. St. Paul held the LWML Southern Zone Prayer Service in February. Pastor Boldt and Pastor Ernewein hosted the live service, "Grace, Mercy, Peace;" which was also available on-line. Their Lenten service project is a collection of hygiene kit items for Orphan Grain Train. Lastly, the ladies were excited to present beautiful hanging glass trio crosses to the two young ladies confirmed on Palm Sunday.



The Southern Zone spring Rally was held at Trinity-Baton Rouge on March 16; using the theme of, "Faith Is Trusting God's Plans" (Romans 8:28). It was a time spent completing Zone business, a Leadership Training Activity, and in praise to God in word and song — a blessing for all who attended.
